

Syrian Forum USA

Established in **2015** and operates through its offices in Chicago, Dallas, and Washington DC, Syrian Forum USA works in partnership with the Syrian Forum to support programs related to development and humanitarian affairs, economic empowerment, research and public policy, and advocacy to shed light on the humanitarian situation and the Syrian crisis.

Here is an overview of Syrian Forum USA's activities in **2023**:

- Organizing **6** main US grassroots outreach tours for the Syrian Forum's Board of Directors to share updates from the ground regarding the Syrian humanitarian situation and the earthquake response to encourage donations. In these tours, several meetings and events were held with various communities to promote a deeper understanding of the complex issues that are facing Syria, inspire action, and ultimately encourage positive change.
- Conducting over **100** events, including Khutbas and social gatherings.
- Creating strategic partnerships with other organizations such as Palestine Children's Relief Fund (PCRF), Basmah, INARA, Uzbek American Association of Chicago, and Islamic Association of Collin County to maximize the response efforts during the Feb 6th earthquake.
- Raising awareness about the Syrian cause by sponsoring/attending **22** events such as the Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS), Islamic Circle of North America (ICNA), Islamic Society of North America (ISNA), Muslim American Society (MAS), Council on American–Islamic Relations (CAIR), Council of Islamic Organizations of Greater Chicago (CIOGC).

Operational Consortium

In response to the devastating earthquake that struck large areas in Türkiye and Syria on February 6, exacerbating the ongoing humanitarian crisis, an operational consortium was formed between the **Syrian Forum**, the **Syria Civil Defense (White Helmets)**, and the **Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS)**.

The earthquake compounded the challenges faced by the Syrian people over twelve years, including infrastructure destruction, healthcare and education sectors deterioration, and a lack of stability and safety.



Recognizing the urgent need for coordinated efforts, the Consortium contributed to:

- Rehabilitation of Al-Hal Market in Afrin (main city market), which includes more than **100** shops.
- Restoration and support of **30** schools damaged by the earthquake.
- Rehabilitation of the amphitheater of Gaziantep University in Afrin.
- Expansion of Al-Shifa Hospital in the city of Afrin to serve more people.
- Paving of **5 KM** long roads.
- Rehabilitation and asphaltting of **1.6 KM** long of the third bridge road in the city of Afrin, and **9.5 KM** long of Afrin - Kafr Janna road.



How We Work

Needs Based

Our approach to programs based on understanding and identifying the needs of local communities through various assessment tools, including interviews, focus group discussions, and surveys.

Strong Program Design

The Programs Department works to identify gaps and create a program aimed at addressing the root causes of needs. Communities and local councils are consulted at this stage to better understand the feasibility of such programs and to ensure community participation.



Continuous Institutional Development and Capacity Building

Reviewing all the operations of the organization's departments and ensuring that the policies and procedures adopted are followed, in addition to developing suggestions and recommendations that enhance the internal control process and raise the level of professionalism and transparency within the organization. We also make great efforts to build the capacities of the team, especially those working on the front lines.

Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning

Through this function, we can monitor the outputs of programs and measure their impact throughout baseline and end-line assessments. It also provides access to beneficiaries to give their feedback and complaints. Our MEAL department allows us to learn lessons from previous projects and apply them moving forward to strengthen our future programming.



Food Security and Livelihoods (FSL)

- Distribute over **5.6K** meals during Ramadan, and **8,250** kg of meat portions in Eid al-Adha.
- Distribute **+53** ton of bread, **+54.7K** food baskets, and ready-to-eat meals, in addition to **17K** food vouchers.
- Support over **13.8K** livestock breeders with the necessary training to enhance their skills and practices.
- Provide vaccinations for **635K** sheep.
- Distribute **60K** kg of fertilizers, more than **36K** kg of seeds, and **600** liters of insecticides to farmers.
- Distribute **400** set of agricultural tools to farmers, in addition to **200** set of safety and security equipment.
- Support **41.6K** olive trees with agricultural services such as pruning and harvesting, and **21.2K** dunums with seeds, fertilizers, and insecticides.
- Establish **10** field schools for farmers & provide training on best agricultural practices for over **280** farmers.

- Construct **16** residential units in Babisqa to provide shelter for families affected by the earthquake.
- Rehabilitate **1,286** houses in Afrin, Armanaz, Azmarin, and other earthquake-affected areas.
- Distribute over **12K** baskets of household items, and over **10K** baskets of blankets and winter clothes.
- Site preparation and graveling for **17,825** m² of **6** camps.
- Distribute **21.5K** multi-purpose cash vouchers and winter vouchers totaling over **\$3.9M**.
- Provide cash vouchers for home repairs to over **570** earthquake-affected families.
- Distribute **565** tents and heaters to earthquake-affected families, and over **70K** liters of heating materials.

These initiatives encompass socio-economic revitalization efforts as well as the rehabilitation and restoration of essential infrastructure and services.

- Rehabilitate Al-Hal Market in Afrin, which includes more than **100** shops.
- Restore the amphitheater of Gaziantep University in Afrin.
- Rehabilitate and pave roads **5 KM** long.

Child Protection

- Provide **3,600** vulnerable children with specialized individual assistance and case management services.
- Distribute **38K** identification bracelets for children to prevent separation from their families during displacement after the earthquake.
- Distribute over **6,500** newborns and first aid kits.
- Provide more than **2,000** parental skills and over **16,800** awareness and psychosocial support sessions.
- Establish **7** community committees and conduct **23** trainings on child protection against exploitation and sexual abuse.



Women Empowerment Program

- Projects in this sector created **658** job opportunities for field staff.
- Provide over **76K** psychosocial, life skills, and recreational sessions, in addition to awareness sessions for young mothers.
- Provide educational training such as English courses, computer, and robotic programs for young girls.
- Support **6** women's associations and establish **28** community women's committees to raise awareness of women in the community.
- Distribute more than **138K** dignity kits for women and girls.
- Support **128** women with income generation projects.
- Provide over **790** vocational training sessions on sewing, handicraft, hairdressing, confectionery, and entrepreneurship.
- Provide over **3,300** consultations for women and girls, and 163 training sessions on gender-based violence.
- Support **3,400** gender-based violence cases through psychosocial activities and referrals to specialized sectors when needed.



General Protection

- Establish **4** community committees and launch **12** initiatives to raise awareness on general protection matters.

- Water, sanitation, and hygiene services targeted **312** camps, **19** health centers, and **205** schools.
- Connect **1** water station to the electricity grid, establish **2** water stations, **6** water networks, and **14** sewage systems.
- Conduct more than **157K** hygiene awareness sessions in schools & camps.
- Distribute over **1.9M** m³ of drinking water to people in camps (**35** liters/beneficiary/day).
- Rehabilitate **6** water networks, **12** water stations, and install **7** solar energy systems to support alternative and clean energy and sustain service delivery.



- Distribute **2K** garbage containers, collect over **70K m³** of solid waste to landfills, and desludge of septic tanks in schools, health centers, and camps.
- Provide operational support to **27** water stations, including electricity (**2.9M kWh**), fuel (**396K liters**), and chlorine (**29K liters**), in addition to maintenance services, as well as training station workers and covering their wages.

- Construct and rehabilitate **5K** toilet blocks in camps, including facilities for people with special needs.

Our education projects are designed to address the multifaceted challenges faced by children and teachers in northern Syria. Through our comprehensive efforts in schools' rehabilitation, distribution of educational materials, and targeted support

for teachers, we seek to dismantle the barriers to education, fostering an environment where learning can flourish against all odds, because we believe that education is the most powerful tool for empowerment and change.

- Rehabilitate **78** schools, including **41** schools as part of the emergency response to the earthquake.
- Support **60** schools with operational expenses, furniture, and winter needs such as heaters and heating fuel.
- Distribute **7,350** textbooks, over **34K** school bags, recreational tools, and personal hygiene kits for students.
- Provide over **\$2M** as salaries to **1,557** teachers and administrative staff.
- Distribute more than **\$59K** as cash for education for students.
- Conduct **99** awareness campaigns for **COVID-19** and **Cholera**, and **38** awareness campaigns on child protection and the importance of education.
- Provide solar power systems to **18** schools, as well as security and safety equipment to **55** schools.
- Provide transportation for students living far from their schools, and for those with special needs.
- Distribute **317** educational bags for teachers and conduct **17** capacity building training to improve their skills.
- Rehabilitate sanitization and sanitary facilities for **113** schools.
- Secure **57** field job opportunities through education projects.



Our Education Model

Our **Education Model** extends beyond curricula and technologies used; it requires a comprehensive focus on the **student**, the **family**, and the **teacher**. Providing an educational environment that encourages continuity in learning positively impacts the development of students and helps them reach their full potential. By involving both families and teachers, this **Education Model** enhances the educational experience and addresses the holistic needs of students.

We believe that education is not just a fundamental right for every child, but it is the cornerstone for achieving sustainable development and regaining agency in northern Syria. It is the gateway that opens new horizons for individuals and communities, enabling them to achieve their aspirations and contribute to building a better future.

In **2023**, we opened our first two schools within the educational complex in Azaz:

- Elementary School for boys and girls: **205** students, **90%** are orphans
- Middle and High School for girls: **200** students, **50%** are orphans

We have also started the construction of **3** new schools by the end of **2023**, to welcome students in September **2024**:

- Middle and High School for boys within the educational complex – Azaz
- Elementary School for boys and girls – Jarablus
- Middle School for girls – Jarablus

In addition to the **Family Support Center** and an academy for **Teachers' Capacity Building**, which will be included in the educational complex.

Through this **Education Model**, we aim to provide equal opportunities for learning and growth for orphans and the most vulnerable children, giving them the chance to build a brighter future, and engage families in the educational process to foster a supportive home environment bridging school and home life, in addition to equipping teachers with the skills to be effective educators and advocates for all children.





Economic Empowerment

Our economic empowerment projects reflect our commitment to achieving sustainable and comprehensive development in northern Syria. Our program aims to empower Syrians to achieve self-sufficiency through capacity building training, small business grants, and advanced bootcamps to train Syrian

youth on marketable skills in the technology sector, which enables them to attain sustainable job opportunities, contributing to optimal investment in individuals and enhancing the ability of local communities to recover and achieve sustainable stability.

The projects aimed to support families led by women, individuals with special needs, and people who can work and generate income. These projects were built upon a tailored framework and strategic plan, which commenced by equipping beneficiaries with essential skills in small business management, activity planning, budgeting, market analysis, and profit estimation.

By equipping these individuals with the necessary tools and knowledge, we not only enhance their capacity to support themselves and their families but also stimulate local economies, lead to improved community resilience, and reduce dependency on external aid.

The grants supported projects such as:

- Barber shop
- Clothing shop
- Grocery stores
- Coffee roasters
- Sewing workshop
- Mobile phone repair
- Women's beauty salon
- Food processing centers
- Household goods and tools
- Dairy and cheese production
- Stationery and school supplies



Dollani Initiative

The Dollani initiative was launched in **2023**, as part of the Syrian Forum's economic empowerment program, to develop the capabilities and empower youth in northern Syria in the digital technology field to enhance their job opportunities and achieve sustainable income.

Dollani focuses on:

- **Bootcamps:** Intensive and specialized training courses in the digital technology sector to develop the skills of youth in northern Syria.
 - 2** Bootcamps - Writing content in Arabic for SEO
 - 3** months/per camp
 - 44** trainees
- **Workshops:** to empower trainees with the necessary tools to enhance their knowledge and succeed in their professional paths through an interactive learning environment.
- **Career counseling:** to enhance the skills of participants to reach their full potential, as well as develop their professional paths through support and guidance.
- **Dollani Talk:** Interactive sessions aim to create interactive communication between Dollani trainees and professional guests to benefit from their experiences and success stories.



Support The Digital Transformation of Small and Medium Enterprises

This project is designed to assist small and medium-sized Syrian enterprises in Türkiye in navigating the obstacles they encounter with customer relationship management. The project facilitated the adoption of digital solutions, providing businesses with access to a Customer Relationship

Management (CRM) system, along with extensive training for their staff. Moreover, personalized consulting sessions were offered, all aimed at enhancing the companies' digital engagement capabilities and improving their customer interactions.

The project aims to train women in various sectors such as graphic design, social media management, and digital marketing to develop marketing content, in addition to workshops on work culture in Türkiye.

Upon completion of the training, **40** beneficiaries were connected to job opportunities matching their received training, and to encourage employers to hire beneficiaries, employers received incentives for **3** months to pay employees' salaries.

Omran is an independent research institution with a leading role in the scientific and knowledge-building of Syria and the region, state, and society. Arab Think Tanks Platform Project

The goal of this project is to foster peace in Syria through the collection, discussion, and dissemination of diverse perspectives to research institutions, policymakers, and stakeholders involved in Syrian affairs through regular visits, on-ground interviews, and workshops. This involves engaging with decision-makers, specialists, and academics familiar with Syrian issues from countries including Türkiye, Lebanon, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, and Qatar. 
The research papers were categorized into four themes; political, economic, administrative, and educational, distributed across seven main chapters.

Our Impact

- **Addressing the Implications of the Russian Veto on the Cross-Border Humanitarian Aid Mechanism, Exploring and Evaluating Advocacy Options**

A webinar organized in collaboration with Syrian Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and Civil Society Organizations (CSOs). The objective was to address the repercussions of the Russian veto on humanitarian aid efforts in Syria, and the implications of the Syrian regime's decision to extend its approval for ongoing operations through the Bab al-Hawa crossing, both operationally and legally.

- **The Dutch Canadian Lawsuit Against The Syrian Regime Before The International Court of Justice**

A webinar aimed to explore the legal jurisdiction of the International Court of Justice and the potential outcomes of The Dutch Canadian lawsuit. Additionally, the speakers discussed political action and advocacy strategies that civil society organizations can employ, particularly in relation to the ongoing case. Featured speakers included a lawyer and international law consultant, human rights and advocacy activists, and members of the Saydnaya Detainees Association.

- **The Syria Sanctions Policy Program (SSPP) Launch Event**

A webinar conducted to introduce the goals and deliverables of the SSPP (Syrian Sanctions Policy Program), which is a joint effort between the Syrian Forum, Omran for Strategic Studies, and the Observatory of Political and Economic Networks.

The program works toward improving the efficacy of Western sanctions on the Assad regime by bridging the gap between researchers, policymakers, bureaucrats, and politicians to influence Western sanctions on Syria in a way that weakens the Assad regime and increases the likelihood of behavioral change, minimizes the side effects on civilians and removes the hurdles to humanitarian response, counters the narrative, pushed primarily by the regime and its backers, that sanctions are the main reason behind the suffering of civilians, and nuances the narrative that sanctions have no side effects on civilians.



○ **Advocacy Tour on the Sideline of The Human Rights Council and United Nations General Assembly - September**

Geneva

During the fifty-fourth session of the Human Rights Council at the United Nations Office in Geneva, the Syrian Forum delegation engaged in two days of meetings with various country missions. Discussions centered on ensuring sustained humanitarian aid to Syria and addressing concerns about international investigative mechanisms for human rights violations. Political developments in Syria and the region were also reviewed. Additionally, the delegation organized a side event titled “Reshaping the Future of Syria: Examining the Roles of Unions,

Student Unions, and Non-Governmental Organizations in Upholding Human Rights,” sponsored by the Permanent Mission of the European Union. This session focused on the contributions of these entities in Syria and underscored the regime’s exploitation of unions for oppression, emphasizing the vital role of civil society organizations in improving Syria’s situation, while highlighting the humanitarian, health, and economic challenges facing Syrians and the positive impact of civil society organizations in effecting change.

Washington DC

In collaboration with The Atlantic Council’s Syria Project, and The New Lines Institute for Strategy and Policy Special Captagon Trade Project, the Syrian Forum organized a public discussion in Washington D.C. to present a thorough analysis of the challenges and suggested strategies outlined in the recently published “U.S. Strategy to Address Captagon,” and to deliberate on their implications for policymakers and think tanks. The event featured experts from the United States, Syria, the European Union, and the United Kingdom. Our delegation also had a series of significant meetings with key officials, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, and his Syria team at the U.S. Department of State, the Middle

East Bureau of the U.S. Agency for International Development, the Director for Humanitarian Assistance Operations at the National Security Council of The White House, the Democratic member of the Subcommittee on Foreign Operations and Related Programs in the U.S. House of Representatives, along with parallel meetings included discussions with the American humanitarian aid coordination team for Syria. The meetings focused on the need for increased American support in northwest Syria, particularly to support stabilization efforts, and the challenges in implementing development work and enhancing early recovery activities in northern Syria.

New York

Meetings with eight permanent missions from both Security Council and non-Security Council members were held, focusing primarily on the deteriorating humanitarian crisis in northern Syria, highlighting the dire humanitarian situation in Idlib, and underscoring the critical role played by local organizations in meeting

essential needs despite being sidelined from decision-making processes.

An agreement was reached to maintain communication and consult on cross-border aid entry while planning periodic updates for potential paths within the General Assembly concerning Syria.



○ **Advocacy Tour - Washington DC** **November**

- Sponsoring the National Muslim Business and Entrepreneur Leadership Summit at the U.S. Department of Commerce in Washington, D.C., in collaboration with Emgage. The event brought together senior government officials, community leaders, and business professionals to exchange ideas and explore resources and opportunities from the federal government for the business community. During this event, the Syrian Forum introduced its strategic initiatives aimed at fostering economic empowerment in northern Syria and shaping the future landscape of business and entrepreneurship.
- Meeting with the House Appropriations Subcommittee on State and Foreign Operations, along with the American Coalition for Syria (ACS), focusing on the importance of increased stabilization aid, education, and healthcare in northwest Syria, addressing the pressing humanitarian needs of the region, and highlighting the necessity of prioritizing Syria's plight and the transformative effect that increased support could bring to the region.

○ **The Narrative and Implications of Sanctions in Syria - Berlin**

In collaboration with The Syrian Legal Development Program (SLDP) and The Syrian Civil Society Networks Platform (SCNP), the workshop titled "The Narrative and Implications of Sanctions in Syria" took place in Berlin. This event fostered diverse dialogue among Syrian stakeholders, exploring strategies to hold perpetrators accountable while safeguarding civilians.

It aimed to encourage collaboration among civil society organizations, human rights advocates, and experts to address the challenges posed by sanctions in Syria.

○ **Press Conference to Announce the Operational Consortium - Idleb**

A joint press conference held in Idleb to announce the operational consortium formed between the Syrian Forum, the Syrian Civil Defense (White Helmets), and the Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS).

The press conference served as a pivotal platform to inform the public, media, and stakeholders about the concerted efforts and coordinated response strategies aimed at addressing the urgent humanitarian needs arising from the earthquake's aftermath in the affected regions.

Public Relations Outreach

- Over **110** media appearances, all aimed at amplifying voices and increasing awareness and engagement with the Syrian crisis.
- Published **2** press releases and **45** opinion articles on national and international events and causes such as the Needs Not Vetoes campaign, International Human Rights Day, The **12th** Anniversary of The Syrian Revolution, International Women's Day, and The International Day of Innocent Children Victims of Aggression.
- Creation and production of **6** national songs commemorating the Syrian revolution and the earthquake on February **6th**.
- Sponsored the 1st season of the political show "Al Arab Club" on Al-Aan TV. This program served as a platform for open dialogue and discussion, inviting government figures to delve into pressing issues surrounding Syria and other pertinent topics affecting Arab countries.


